FOREWORD

This Malaysian Standard was developed by the Working Group on Nomenclature and Uses of Commercial Timbers supervised by the Technical Committee on Timber, Timber Products and Timber Structures under the authority of the Industry Standards Committee on Building, Construction and Civil Engineering. Development of this standard was carried out by Malaysian Timber Industry Board, which is the Standards-Writing Organisation (SWO) appointed by SIRIM Berhad to develop standards for timber, timber products and timber structures.

This Malaysian Standard is the second revision of MS 229, Nomenclature and users of commercial timbers of Malaysia (First revision).

Major modifications in this revision are as follows:

- a) incorporation of 27 less common timber trade groups;
- b) strength grouping SG1 to SG7 have been introduced; and
- c) usage of each timber species has been specifically described according to its recommended application.

This Malaysian Standard cancels and replaces MS 229:1988.
